Jupyter supports running with multiple kernels. Unfortunately, adding a virtual environment to Jupyter is not easy. Pycus tries to take the pain out of it, making it painless to add environments.

CHAPTER 1

Installation

Install `pycus` in the same environment as Jupyter:

```
$ pip install pycus
```

This will add a `pycus` subcommand to Jupyter.

CHAPTER 2

Running

```
$ jupyter pycus add [--environment <ENVIRONMENT>]
```

will add the environment.

The ENVIRONMENT can be:

- A full path to a virtual environment
- The name of a `virtualenvwrapper` environment
- Empty, in which case it will be equivalent to the `virtualenvwrapper` environment with the same name as the current working directory's base name. This matches the behavior of `workon ..`

After adding the environment, refresh your JupyterLab browser window, and you should see the new environment as an option in the launcher window.
